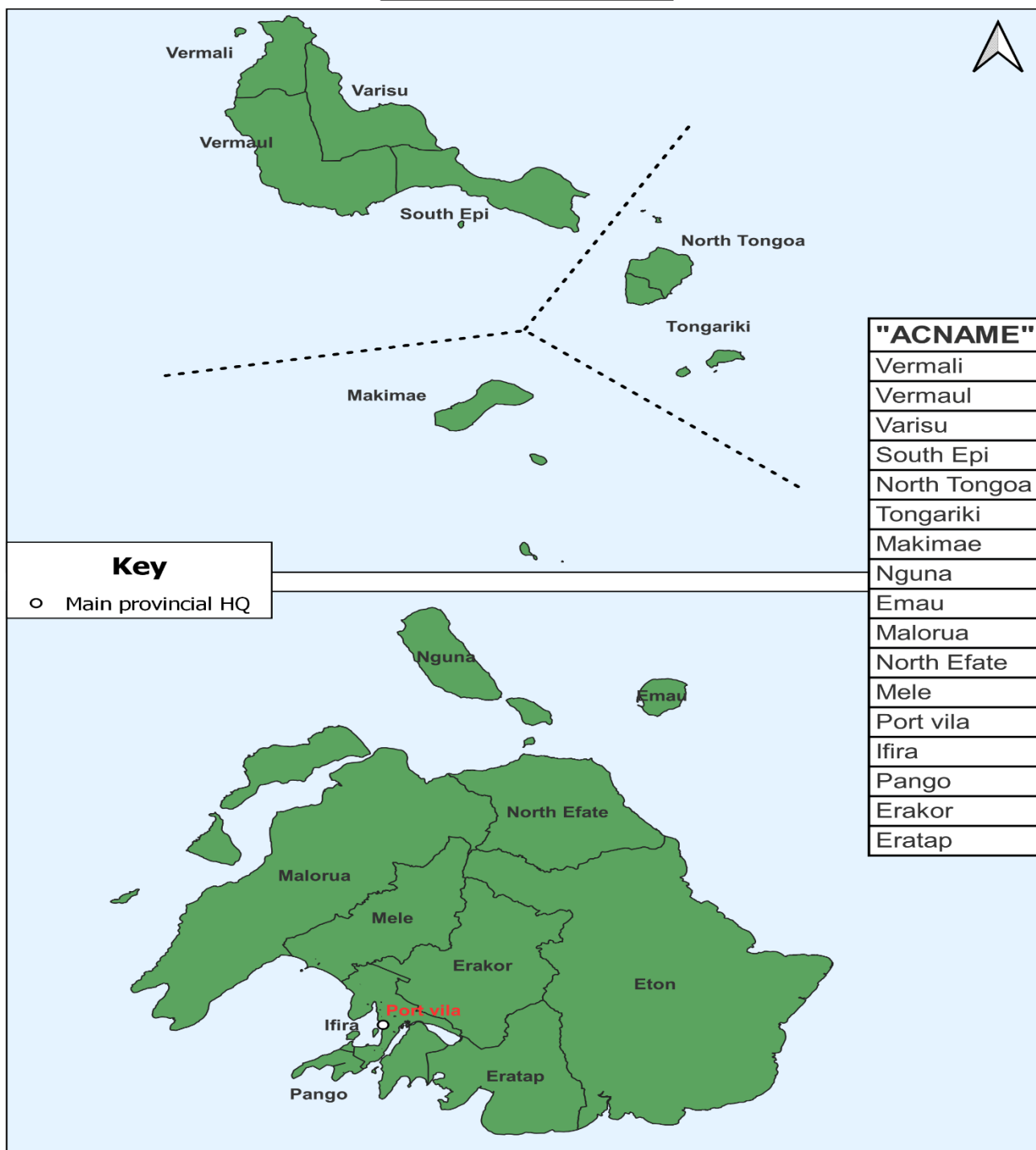

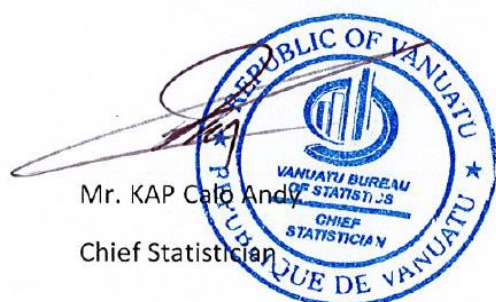

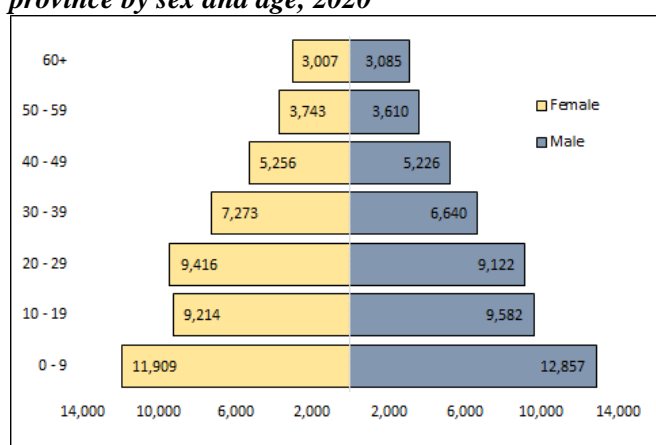

1. Population

1.1 Population of Shefa Province

The 2020 population and housing census indicated that there were about 103,987 people living in Shefa province of which 50% of them were male and 50% female. Like other provinces, Shefa population has a young age structure with 34% of the population aged less than 15 years and only 6% aged over 60 years as shown by the population pyramid.

1.2 Population Density

Density is a good indicator or measure of how a place is crowded or scattered. The higher the population, the higher the crowding.

Shefa province has a total land area of 1,455 km² and a total population of 103,987 according to the 2020 Population & Household Census. This means that the average population density for Shefa province is 89 people per km².

1.3 Sex Ratio

Differences between the number of males and females can be seen using the sex ratio. In 2020, the sex ratio for Shefa province is 101 – meaning that for every 100 females, there are 101 males. There are more males than females in Shefa province.

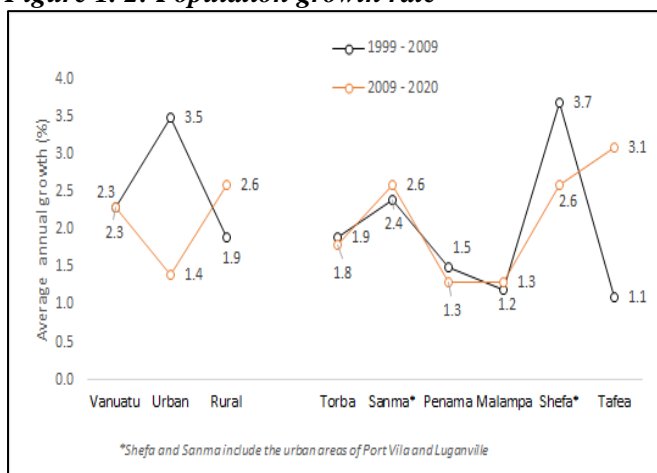

1.4 Population Growth Rate

The Shefa population growth rate has decreased from 3.7% per year between 1999-2009 to 2.6% between 2009-2020.

Figure 1. 2: Population growth rate



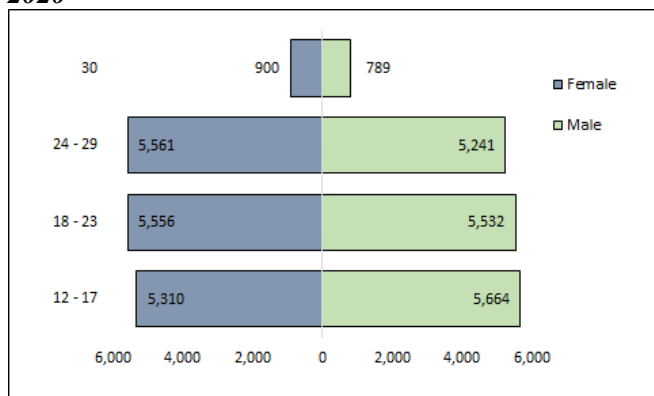

2. Youth

2.1 Youth Population

The age group of 12-30 years is used in the official youth policy and accounts for 34,553 of young people in Shefa. Youth population by sex is represented by 50% (17,226) males and 50% (17,327) females. In addition, youth population represents 33% of the total population of Shefa.

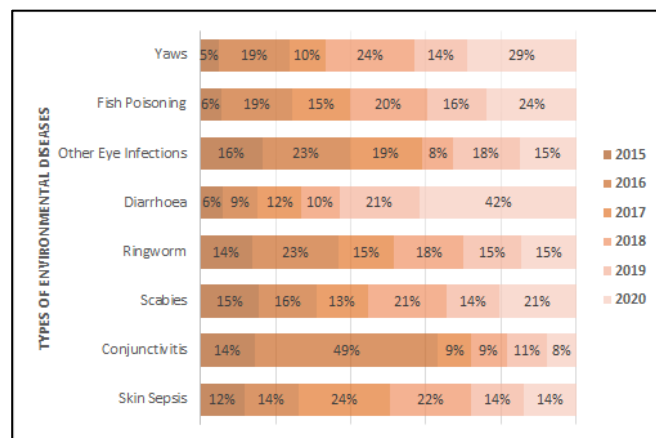
3. Health

3.1 Environmental Diseases

Some interesting statistics were documented for environmental illnesses in Shefa province. 2020 accounted for 42% of all diarrhoea cases since 2015, it also accounted for 29% of all Yaws cases and 24% of fish poisoning. The least number of cases of which 2020

accounted for since 2015 was conjunctivitis, which stood at 8% in 2020.

Figure 3. 1: Environmental diseases in Shefa province, 2015-2020

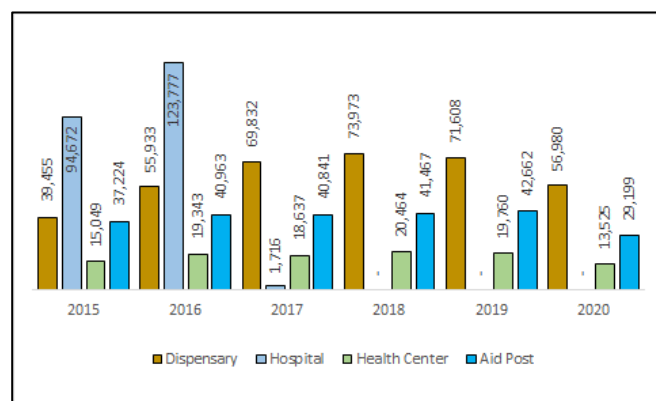

3.2 Outpatient consultations

Over time, there seems to be a lot less outpatient consultations. Dispensaries, Aid-Posts, and Health Centers have all shown a somewhat upward trend in cases from 2015 to 2019 when compared to Hospitals which dramatically dropped after 2016. Hospitals had the highest number of cases, exceeding 100,000 cases, in 2016.

Figure 3. 2: Number of outpatient consultations reported in Shefa by facility type, 2015-2020



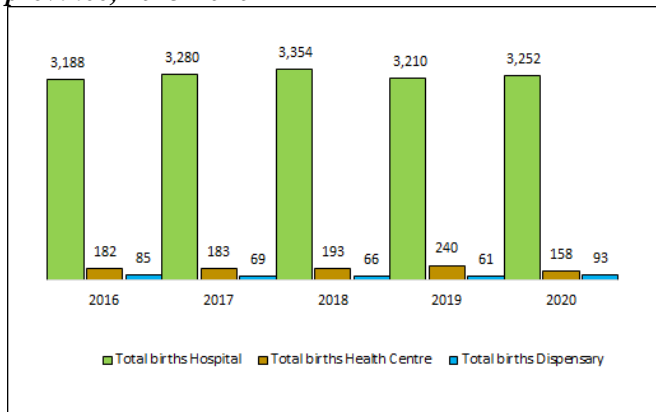

3.3 Birth Deliveries

Birth Deliveries in Shefa Province recorded a decrease of 19% from 2016 to 2017 for dispensaries, a small rise for hospitals of 1%, and health centres at 3%.

In 2020, similar to other years observed, the data indicated that the majority of birth deliveries, at 93%, took place in hospitals, with 5% occurring in health centres and 3% in dispensaries.

Figure 3. 3: Number of births deliveries in Shefa province, 2015-2020

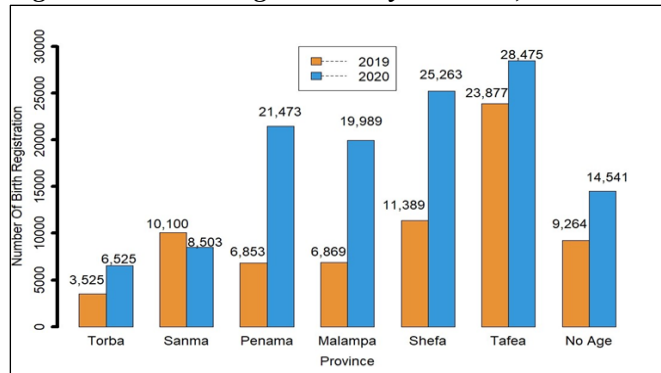

3.4 Birth Registration

According to data from Civil Registration and Vital Statistics, there has been a notable improvement in birth registration, evident from the increase in recorded births, which rose from 11,389 in 2019 to 25,263 in 2020. This increase indicates a substantial year-on-year change in the number of registered births.

Figure 3. 4: Birth Registration by Province, 2019-2020



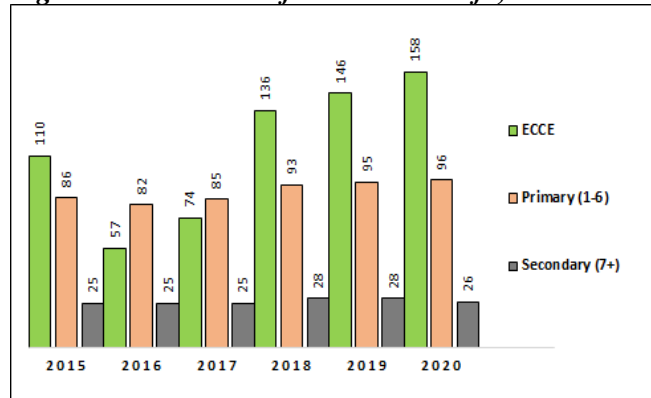

4. Education

4.1 Total Number of Schools in Shefa

According to VEMIS report, the Early Childhood Care Education (ECCE) recorded the highest number of schools in 2020 with 158 schools in Shefa, followed by primary schools with 96. The number of secondary schools dropped slightly from 2019 to 2020 to 26.

Figure 4. 1: Number of schools in Shefa, 2015-2020

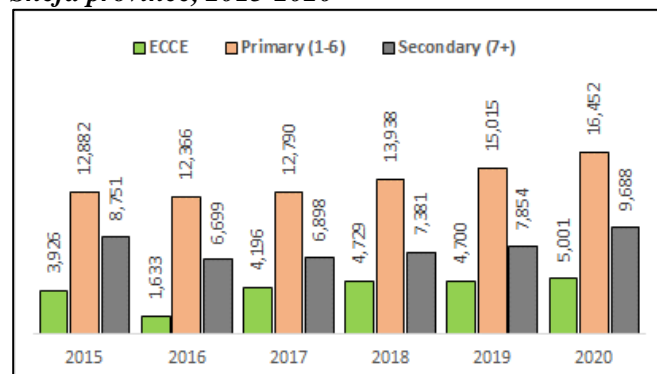

4.2 Enrollments by School Type, Shefa province

Enrolments by school type in Shefa has increased in 2020 with ECCE recording 5,001, Primary (1-6 years) with 16,452 and Secondary (7+) with a total of 9,688, compared to the previous years.

Figure 4. 2: Education enrollments by school type, Shefa province, 2015-2020

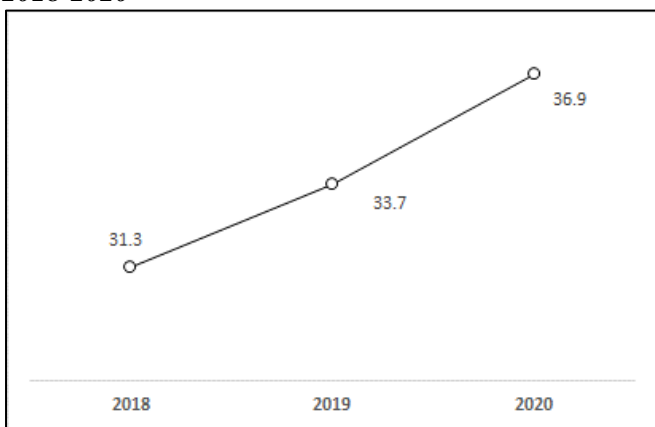

4.3 Student Classroom Ratio for Primary Schools

As per the VEMIS digest annual reports, the Student Classroom Ratio (SCR) is described as the average count of students per classroom. According to the recommended guideline, a classroom should ideally accommodate 30 students throughout a school year. Analysing the SCR trend for Shefa province, there has been a consistent increase, surpassing the standard ideal size, reaching 36.9 students per classroom in 2020. This is an increasing trend, 2019 had an SCR of 33.7 students per classroom, in contrast to 31.3 in 2018.

Figure 4. 3: Student classroom ratio, Shefa province, 2018-2020

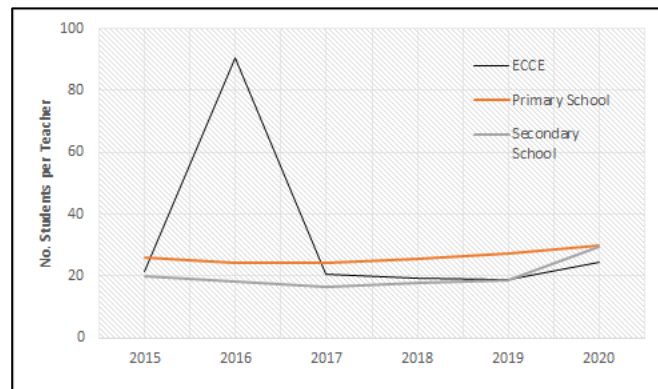

4.4 Student Teacher Ratio

VEMIS reported the standard student teacher ratio as 1 teacher to 15 students in ECCE, 1 teacher to 30 students in Primary, and 25-30 students per teacher in Secondary level. Overall, Shefa province has remained within the standard ratio at all education levels, except for an anomalous year for ECCE in 2016.

Figure 4. 4: Student teacher ratio, Shefa province, 2015-2020

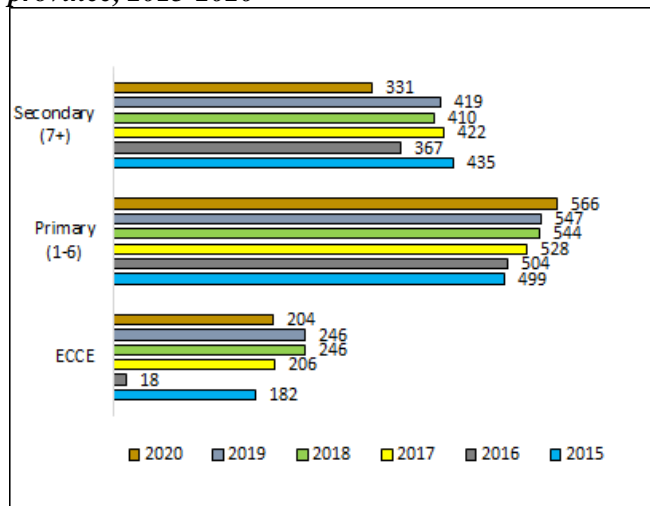

4.5 Number of Teachers by Level of Education

Primary school has the most number of teachers and has shown an increasing trend, with the total number of teachers increasing to 566 in 2020 compared to 547 in the previous year. Secondary level on the other hand has fluctuated, with a larger drop than previous years in 2020 to 331 teachers from 419 in 2019. ECCE number of teachers also fluctuated with a drop in 2020 to 204 teachers from 246 in 2019.

Figure 4. 5: Number of teachers by school type, Shefa province, 2015-2020



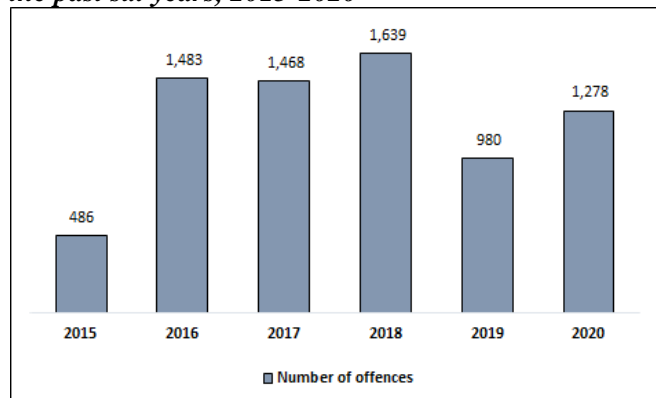

5. Justice

5.1 Crime Rates

Crime rates over the past years were higher through 2016-2018, with over 1,400 offences in each year. The aggregate count of reported offenses in Shefa Province dropped to a total of 980 cases in 2019, only to rebound with an increase to 1,278 cases in 2020.

5.2 Offense by type

The table below ranked the top 10 type of crimes committed in 2015-2020. In 2020, the most common crime was intentional assault with a share of 20%, Domestic Violence accounted for 19% of the crimes committed and third was theft accounting for 11%.

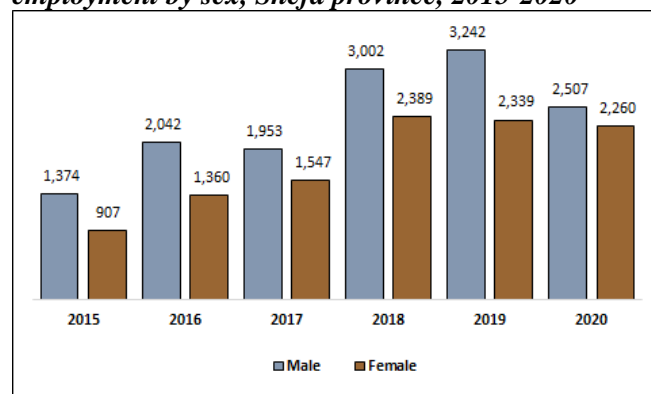

6. Employment

6.1 VNPF Membership

A total of 24,922 VNPF members were recorded from 2015 to 2020. The contributing members indicate that still males outnumber females. Contributing members numbers show a continuous increase over the years with the highest in 2019 with a total of 5,581 members, representing 3,242 male and 2,339 female. Moreover, within the period of 2015 to 2020, males represented 57% (14,120) with females only representing 43% (10,802) of the total members contribution.

Figure 6. 1: VNPF contributing members/Formal employment by sex, Shefa province, 2015-2020

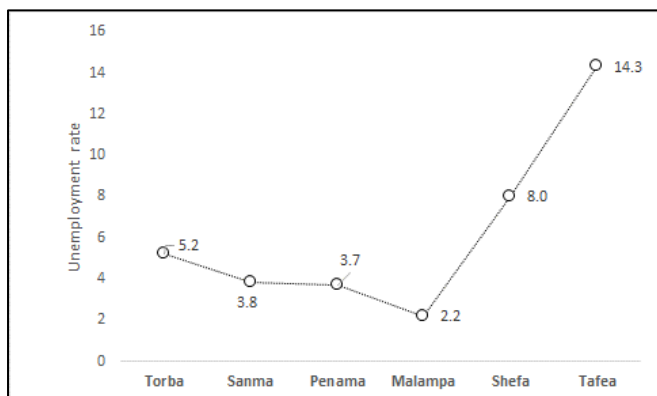

6.2 Unemployment rate

The unemployment rate is the number of people unemployed by a given age and sex and/or place of rural–urban residence, divided by the population in the labour force with the same characteristics, multiplied by 100. Unemployment rates were highest in Tafea (14.3) and Shefa (8.0) while the lowest were in Sanma (3.8), Penama (3.7) and Malampa (2.2).

Figure 6. 2: Unemployment rate, 2020



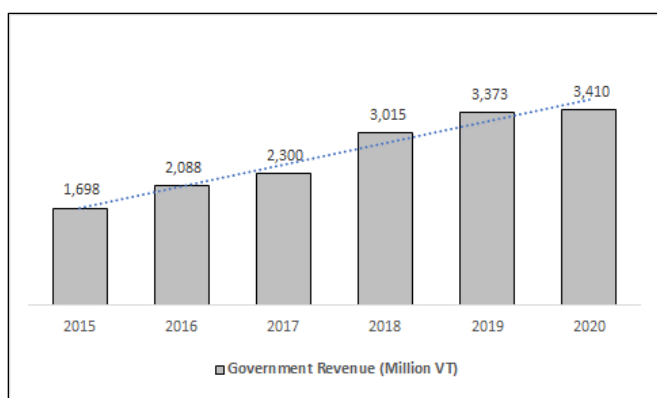

7. Government Finance Statistics (GFS)

7.1 Total Revenue

The government continued to increase its annual revenue collection during 2015-2020 with a total of over 15,800 billion vatu collected. The highest record was in 2020 with over 3,410 billion vatu recorded representing over 22% of the total revenue for the period observed.

Figure 7. 1: Accumulated growth in the Government revenue (Million VT), Shefa province, 2015-2020



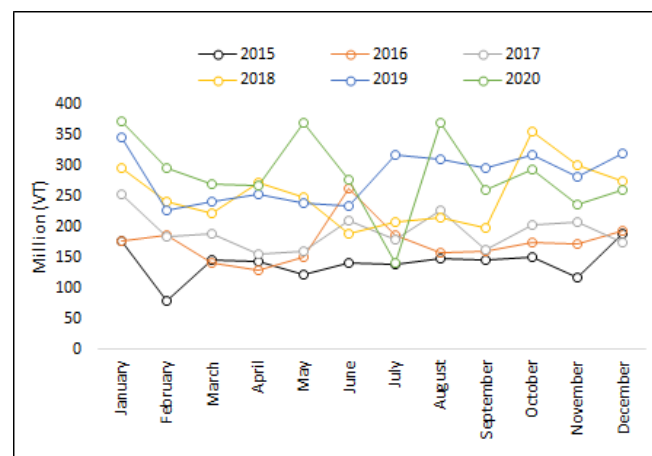

7.2 Monthly Revenue

The highest monthly revenue collected from 2015 to 2019 occurred in January, which when summed exceeds VT1,600 million. Subsequently, significant revenue amounts were recorded in August, October, and December, each surpassing VT1,400 million. June and November saw collections exceeding VT1,300 million, while February, March, April, May, and

September all generated over VT1,200 million. The lowest collection was recorded in July, amounting to just above VT1,100 million.

7.3 Government Revenue Collectors

The following table ranks the top 5 Government revenue collectors over the 2015 to 2020 period. In 2020, Customs & Inland Revenue had the highest total collection of VT1,454 million, Finance recorded VT764 Million, Ports & Harbour had VT28 Million, Department of Health was at VT15 Million and Biosecurity had a total collection of VT10 Million.

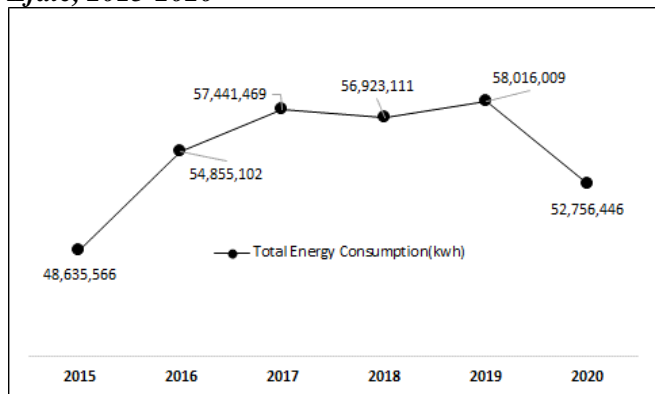

8. Energy Consumption

8.1 Consumption Rate

Electricity consumption tends to be generally rising throughout the period peaking in 2019 at 58,016,009 KWh. However, there was a decline in 2020 by 16% to 52,756,446 KWh.

Figure 8. 1: Total energy consumption records for Efate, 2015-2020

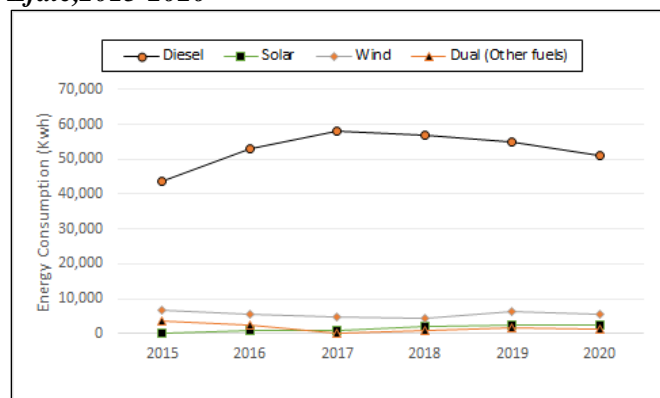

8.2 Sources of electricity

Diesel has been the major source of electricity in Efate accounting for more than 300,000Kwh of electricity consumption between 2015 to 2020, Diesel consumption was the highest in 2017 with over 58,000Kwh. Electricity usage through wind, solar and dual (other fuels) has stayed relatively flatter throughout the period, fluctuating between 0 to 10,000Kwh.

Figure 8. 2: Source of electricity usage by percentage, Efate, 2015-2020



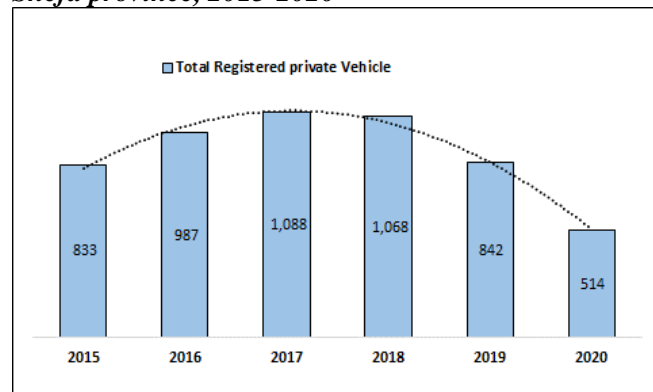

9. Transport

9.1 Motor vehicle registration

Motor vehicle registrations recorded a total of 5,332 vehicles over the period of 2015 to 2020. More than 40% of vehicle registrations occurred in 2017 and 2018 with over 1,000 vehicles registered in each month, whilst the least number of registrations is in 2020 at 514, representing 10% of the total vehicle registration.

Figure 9. 1: Registered number of motor vehicles, Shefa province, 2015-2020



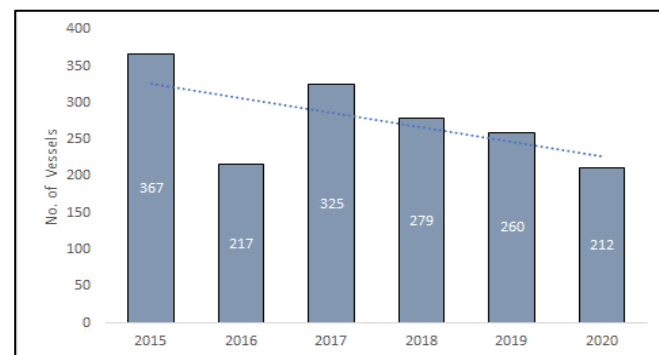

9.2 International Vessels

A total of 1,660 international vessels called in at Efate port during 2015 to 2020. However, a steadily declining trend has been observed from 2015 to 2020. The highest record was in 2015 with 367 international vessels compared to 2020 with the least of 212 vessels.

Figure 9. 2: Total number of international vessels called in at Efate port, 2015-2020



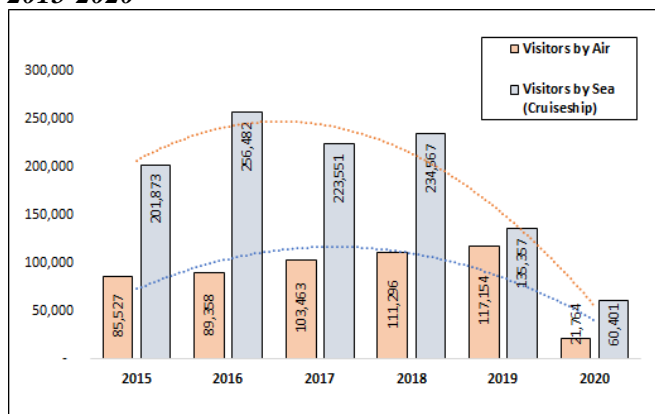

10. Tourism

10.1 Total International Visitors by Air and Sea

The number of visitors by air showed a consistent rise from 2015 to 2019, with a subsequent decline in 2020. In 2019, Shefa witnessed a peak in air visitors, with a total of 117,154 arrivals. Similarly, visitors arriving by sea showed an upward trend from 2015 to 2018, but decreased in 2019 and 2020.

Figure 10. 1: International visitors to Shefa province, 2015-2020

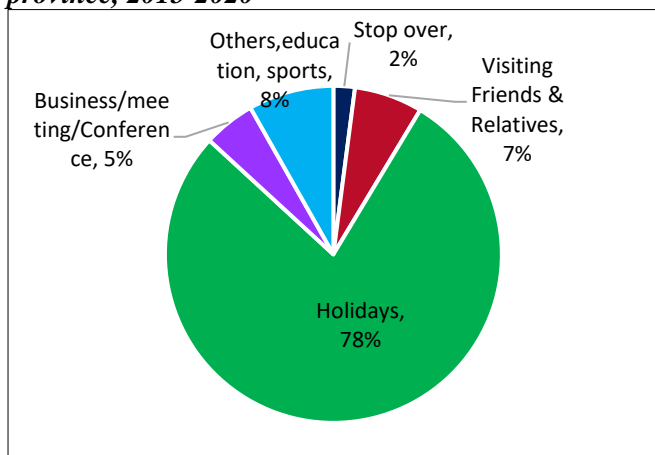

10.2 Purpose of Visit

Most of the tourists visited Shefa province for holidays with 78% share of total tourist arrivals, followed by others (including education and sports) with 8%, visiting friends and relatives with 7%, business purposes at 5% and 2% for stop overs.

Figure 10. 2: Purpose of visits for tourists to Shefa province, 2015-2020

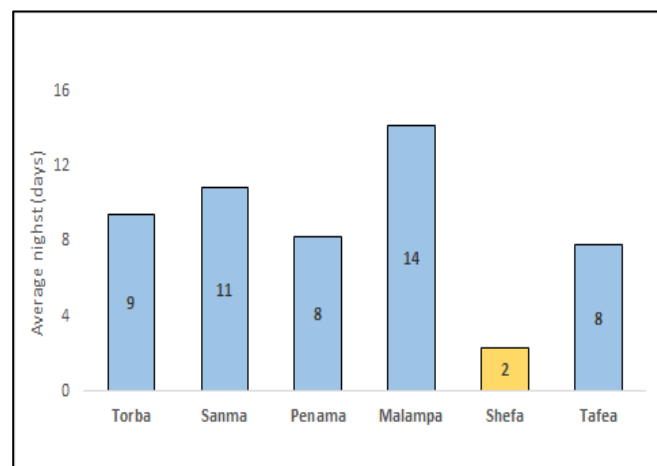

Figure 10. 3: Total visitor's average night spent, 2020



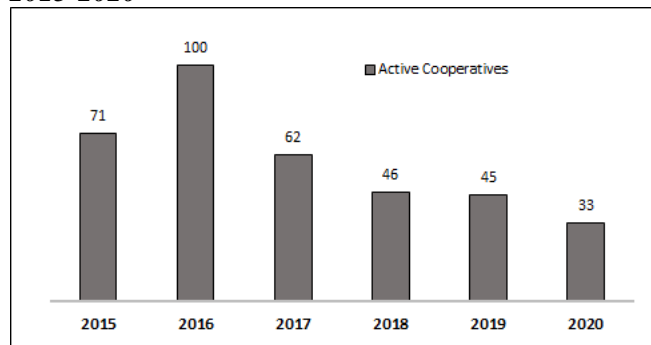

11. Cooperatives

11.1 Active Cooperatives

Cooperative societies have been steadily declining over the past 5 years. The highest number of registered coops was in 2016 with a total of 100 cooperative societies and since then there has been a continuous decline with the least registered coops in 2020 at 33 active coops.

Figure 11. 1: Active cooperatives in Shefa province, 2015-2020

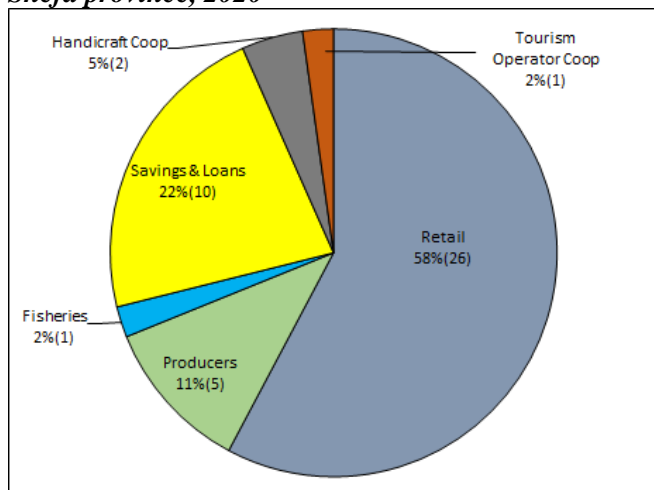

11.2 Types of Active Cooperatives

By nature of activities, the majority of the active cooperatives in 2020 comprised of Retail which accounts for 58% (26), Savings & Loans with 22% (10), Producers at 11% (5), Handicraft Coops at 5% (2) while Fisheries account for just 2% (1).

11.3 Cooperative Membership

Total membership numbers decreased while turnover and the shared dividend to members both increased from 2015 to 2020:

- Membership increases by 29% in 2016 (3,695) and decreased by 18% in 2017 (2,276). From 2017 onwards membership seems to be steadily declining.
- Annual total turnover shows an increase of 25% to 161.4 million in 2016. From 2017 onwards turnover steadily declined until 2019 where it reached 69 million. In 2020 there was a sharp rise by 18% to 119.1 million.
- The dividend distribution to members saw an 11.3% rise in 2016, followed by declines of 4.3% in 2017, 4.2% in 2018, and 2.2% in 2019. However, there was a subsequent increase of 7.4% in the dividends shared in 2020.

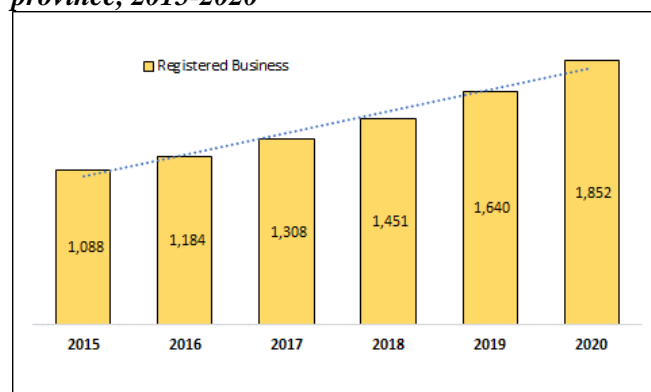

12. Businesses

12.1 Business Registration

The number of businesses registered in 2015 was 1,088 followed by a steadily increasing trend observed from 2015 to 2020 to a total of 1,852 in 2020.

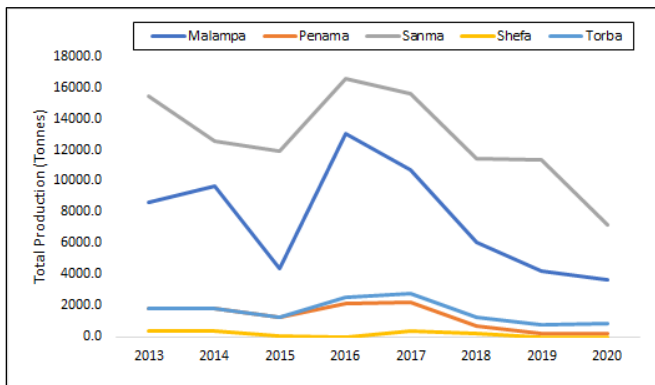
Figure 12. 1: Total business registration in Shefa province, 2015-2020

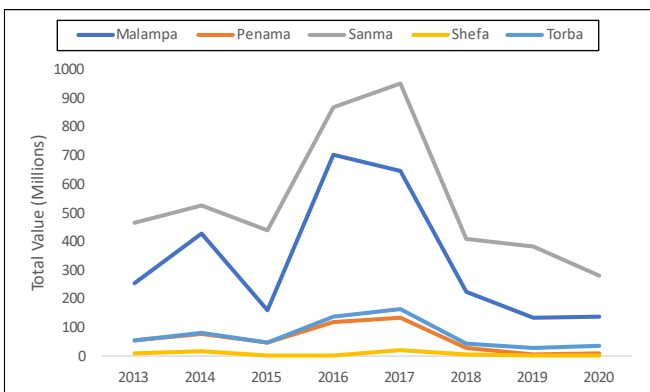
Figure 13. 1. Copra Production in Quantity (Tonnes)

Sanma has the largest copra production of all provinces throughout the observed period 2013-2020, averaging almost 13,000 tonnes each year. Alternatively, Shefa has the lowest production, averaging 160 tonnes a year. There was a spike in copra production in 2016 for Sanma reaching 16,500 tonnes and in 2017 for Shefa reaching 356 tonnes. Since then, copra production has declined across all provinces to reach 7,000 tonnes (-57%) and 0 tonnes (-100%) in Sanma and Shefa, respectively, in 2020.

Figure 13. 2. Copra Production in Value (Millions)

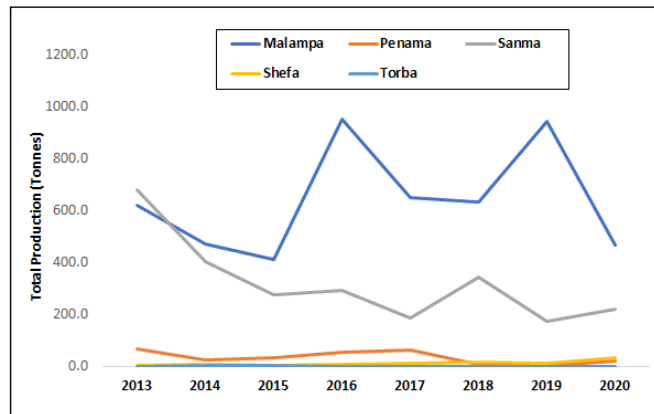

A similar pattern can be seen for copra's value. Sanma and Malampa have the highest copra value out of all provinces. Value fluctuates before 2015, then peaks in 2017 for both Sanma with VUV 951 million and Shefa

with VUV 22 million. From their respective spikes, copra value declines to VUV 279 million (-71%) for Sanma and VUV 0 in Shefa (-100%), in 2020.

Figure 13. 3. Cocoa Production in Quantity (Tonnes)

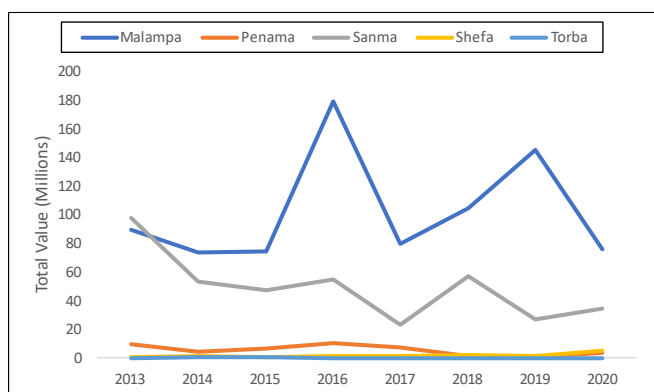

Cocoa production is highest in Malampa, averaging over 5,000 tonnes every year whereas Shefa has the second least cocoa value, averaging below 2 tonnes every year. Over the period however, Shefa's cocoa production can be said to be generally increasing, starting in 2013 with 2.5 tonnes, and ending in 2020 with 34.2 tonnes.

The same can be said for cocoa value for Shefa, increasing from VUV 0.4 million in 2013 to VUV 5.5 million in 2020.

Figure 13. 4. Cocoa Production in Value (Millions)

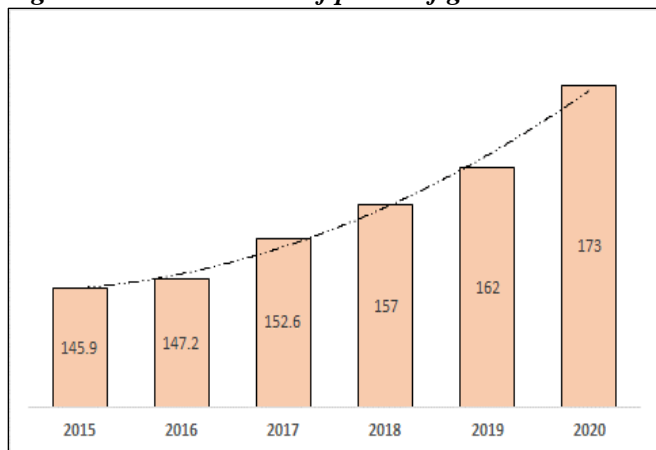

14. Consumer Price Index

CPI stands for Consumer Price Index, which is a measure of the average change over time in the prices paid by urban consumers for a market basket of consumer goods and services. The overall Consumer Price Index inflation rate for Shefa province increased year on year, with a rate of change of 11% from 2019 to 2020. A CPI of 173 in 2020, suggests that there has been a significant increase in prices, which can be an indicator of inflation.

15. Provincial data Challenges

There are several difficulties associated with the analysis of Provincial level statistics. The coverage of statistical indicators varies within the geographical distribution. Being one of the main contributing factors, the collection and analysis of the statistical data had a great impact from the range of geographical hierarchy from the Area Council level to the Village level resulting in underutilization of statistical reporting. Thus, the snapshots of most of the socio-economic indicators of analyses were from particular areas within the provincial boundaries, used as a representation of the entire provincial statistical outlook.

Systems of collection and management of statistical information or data across entities is another contributing factor as most of the data providers do not have a proper system of collection and storage of data. Resources, both financial and human resource capacity, contribute to the variation of the data collected.

Statistical literacy continues to be another challenge however with the setup of provincial statistical offices, one of the objectives is to promote statistical literacy and the importance on the use of statistics in all levels of decision and policy making.
